

Women's History Series: March 8 & 22, April 5 & 19 at 4 - 5:30 pm

Dr. Lin Logan will present this 4-part lecture / film series that examines American women's lives in the 17th through 20th centuries. The 4 sessions will be at the Kill Devil Hills Meeting Room on four Thursdays in March and April from 4 – 5:30 pm. The dates for the sessions are Thursday, March 8 & 22, April 5 & 19 and they are free and open to the general public. **You don't want to miss this!**

Synopsis of the Sessions:

- → 1st session, March 8, will examine the methods & challenges of uncovering women's history. Also learn about Native American women, British colonial women, women's role in the American Revolution, and women and the Constitution.
- → 2nd session, March 22, will look at the Age of Reform, prior to the Civil War, when women took lead roles in the Temperance, Abolitionist, & the Women's Rights Movements. The Civil War, Southern Reconstruction, and a renewed drive to vote will also be included.
- → 3rd session, April 5, explores the Progressive Era where women sought birth control, safe working conditions, and the vote. Margaret Sanger led the Birth Control Movement; Carrie Chapman Catt and Alice Paul led the Women's Right to Vote Movement.
- → 4th session, April 19, begins with women and the Depression Years, followed by a review of the monumental role women played in WWII. Following the war, women began again to demand equal rights. Black women's role in the Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s and the road to the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) will be discussed.

BOE elections will be partisan beginning in 2018. This means that candidates will be competing in May political party primaries and the party winners will compete in the November general election. Previously, BOE candidates competed in one non-partisan election at spring primary time.

Observer Corp Report

Board of Education

The Dare County Board of Education met on January 16 and February 13, 2018 for regular monthly sessions at Nags Head and FF Elementary Schools, respectively. In addition, the Board met in two special sessions on those days to deal with personnel and confidential matters with their attorney in attendance. Also, the NC General Assembly has worked on education legislation during special sessions this winter.

- → Here is some interesting information from the reports portions of the two meetings:
 - The Exceptional Children's Program in Dare Schools and systems across the state will implement the Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) framework of prevention and intervention which promotes school improvement through research-based academic and behavioral practices. The multi-tiered system includes a district team, school teams, all level teams, and building teams to provide guidance, coaching, and technical assistance. The practices will lead to effective problem-solving and strategies for intervention that will improve student performance.
 - The BOE received a 2016-2017 "unmodified" (highest rating) audit report in February. The auditor cited the improved (increased) fund balance (rainy day fund) as she did last year; and, she pointed out that the nutrition/food account is looking good.
 - The central office staff and superintendent presented an overview of a planned (possible) Dual Language Immersion program. Also known as bilingual education, this is a program where children would learn in English and Spanish beginning in kindergarten or first grade and carry on through fifth grade. The program will be presented to parents registering children for kindergarten in March 2018 and to rising first graders at all five elementary schools. Whether the program goes forward depends on demand. Twenty to twenty-three children would be necessary to make a class.

Supt. Dr. Farrelly and Mr. Parker, the new Digital Director, both have experience with such a program. They presented background information that shows children who learn in two languages benefit from high academic achievement, language proficiency, increased critical thinking skills, increased cognitive development, and greater cultural sensitivity. More info to come.

→ In February, from the General Assembly, came a welcome legislative bill to bring a four year extension to the unfunded mandate that the class size law, HB-13, had imposed on schools across North Carolina. In addition, funds will be added for the arts and PE. Schools will now have a chance to plan for lower K-3 class sizes and hopefully save language, PE, and cultural arts classes/teachers. It is widely believed that the advocacy of many grassroots parent groups, PTA'S, Public Schools First, and the LWVNC, among others, who campaigned against the "class size chaos" forced the GA to grant the extension.

The following is a short list of GOOD THINGS from Dare Schools and NEEDED CHANGES coming to Dare Schools:

- FFES Kindergarten students walk to Spring Arbor monthly to visit their resident "friends" where they read and re-tell stories together. Their teacher, Ms. Smalley, said, "This project impacts lives at Spring Arbor and connects generations, one visit at a time." Several SA residents were present at the February BOE meeting to act out the interactions with their student "friends."
- The FFES media coordinator, Jennifer Smith, teaches students to watch out for what *is* credible and what *is not* in the media world.
- Dare Schools new web site will debut on May 15, 2018
- Most monthly meetings include recognitions of teachers who have attained the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards Certification. Dare County has 90 nationally certified edu
- cators. North Carolina has more (21,500) Nat'l Board Certified teachers than any other state.
- Dr. Farrelly reported to the Board that the Visioning meetings, where feedback is encouraged, are "somewhat of a report card."
- The two new (only) social workers are based at the central office and are ready to work in the schools.
- A FFES third grader, Ike Vandermyde, has donated \$200 he raised to his school.
- A FFES group called KSCRP was recognized in February. The acronym stands for *kindness*, *safety*, *cooperation*, *respect*, and *peace* all of which they practice daily.
- Since the Florida school massacre, new lockdown drills for each school are being initiated right away. Three per year are planned. Also, Dr. Farrelly outlined in an e-mail to families nine existing safety protocols from SRO's (school resource officers) to the new "Social Sentinel" social media monitoring system. He told the *Outer Banks Sentinel* that if extra resources were available, "we would pump it into mental health [to increase] the availability of specialists in the school system to work with kids and families."
- A GOOD THING in the media world is an education segment every Tuesday on the News Hour, 6:00 to 7:00 p.m., UNC-TV (PBS). This program is rerun at 7:00 p.m. on NC-N (185—cable) and 12:00 a.m. on UNC-TV.
